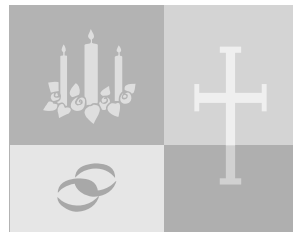
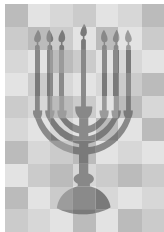

1. Introduction

For the members of SACRE I have not yet had a chance to meet, my name is Cllr Eileen Harris and I was appointed as the new chairman of Ealing's SACRE at the beginning of the 2006-07 municipal year. Before I continue I am sure I will be echoing the thoughts of all SACRE members when I extend my thanks and appreciation to the former chairman, Chris Payne, for his efficient and diligent chairing of the body over the years, I only hope that I can emulate his success in this role.

Although I have been a councillor in Ealing for a number of years, I have not until now been a member of SACRE and I am very much looking forward to getting to grips with the various issues affecting the provision of RE in the borough.

I feel it is tremendously important that all children in Ealing are taught to appreciate the similarities and differences between religions, of which many are represented throughout the borough, as a respect of cultures and beliefs other than one's own can only come through understanding.

My grandmother used to have a saying that has always stayed with me: "We all get into heaven, it's just that we enter by different doors". I can see this sentiment at work in the structure of SACRE, with representatives of such a broad spectrum of beliefs working together for a common aim, and I am certain that this spirit of cooperation will continue well into the future.

Perhaps the most important issue affecting Ealing's SACRE at the moment is the drafting of the new agreed syllabus. I am glad to note that there has been much discussion and debate on this topic, which I feel reflects how committed members of the Agreed Syllabus Conference are to providing a syllabus that fully reflects the variety of faiths in Ealing and enables teachers to provide the subject to the best of their abilities. I am hopeful that the syllabus will shortly be agreed upon so that it can be disseminated to schools in the borough, where it will surely have a positive impact on the provision of religious education in Ealing.

2. Religious education

- 2.1 SACRE continued to monitor the standards of RE teaching in Ealing's schools by considering relevant extracts from OFSTED reports on schools in the borough, both secondary and primary. Schools whose reports were being considered were invited to attend and several sent representatives to answer questions and bring SACRE up to date with progress made in addressing the issues in their report.
- 2.2 When OFSTED announced that from September 2005 it would no longer be producing detailed subject sections in their reports, a working party was formed to decide on the best way for RE to be monitored in future. The group produced a monitoring form that could be used by schools as part of their self-evaluation, with a one-page summary proforma section to be returned to SACRE. This form was to be piloted in two primary and two secondary schools, before being introduced to headteachers at the quadrant meetings.

3. Collective worship

- 3.1 SACRE considered extracts from OFSTED reports on collective worship. Most schools were generally meeting the statutory requirements in relation to collective worship. SACRE wrote to those schools that were deemed to be failing in the requirement to conduct a daily act of worship to offer its assistance.
- 3.2 There were five applications from schools for a determination, or a renewal of their existing determination, to opt out of the requirement for collective worship to be wholly or mainly of a broadly Christian character. Dairy Meadow Primary School, North Primary School and Villiers High School applied for and received determinations. Durdans Park Primary School and Wolf Fields Primary School applied for and received renewals of their determinations.

4. Links with Other Bodies

- 4.1 SACRE continues its membership of the National Association of SACREs and receives copies of the NASACRE newsletter.

5. Other Issues

- 5.1 A team from Ealing City Learning Centre has negotiated with Caspian Learning, a company that promotes educational games software, to produce a module for RE. This software creates 3D computer-generated environments, and in the RE module pupils will be required to visit five environments—a church, a mosque, a synagogue, a temple and a gurdwara—and interact with both a religious figure (e.g. priest) and a member of the congregation to find the answers to the questions posed. Caspian has been so pleased with the results of the team's efforts that they have negotiated to distribute the RE module with the software to all buyers; in compensation, all of Ealing's secondary schools will receive the entire software package—including all of the existing modules—for free.

- 5.2 A “Days of Observance” calendar was again produced for the use of schools and LA officers. This poster-sized calendar contains listings for many religious festivals and other dates of note. An on-line version includes informative articles about all of the festivals mentioned in the calendar, and can be found at www.egfl.org.uk/religion.
- 5.3 SACRE continued the tradition of beginning the meetings with brief informative talks. In September, Dr Anthony Constable, Chair of Ealing Humanist Association and SACRE member, gave a talk entitled “Why disbelief matters”. Ronald Roe spoke about the Baha’i faith at the January meeting, and Jay Lakhani, Director of Education for the Hindu Council UK and adviser to the Department of Education, gave a short presentation on religious pluralism at the meeting in June.
- 5.4 SACRE wrote to all schools in Ealing regarding children entitled to a free school meal who observed periods of fasting during the day for religious reasons (e.g. during the month of Ramadan). It was suggested that schools provide such pupils with a packed lunch for them to take home and eat in the evenings.
- 5.4 In an on-going attempt to gather more accurate data about the faiths represented in our schools, SACRE circulated guidance containing additional codes. Schools were requested to make use of these new codes when recording the religious/philosophical affiliation of pupils.
- 5.5 The Agreed Syllabus Conference, composed of members from each membership group of SACRE, met on several occasions to work on the content and format of the new syllabus. Unfortunately an agreement on the syllabus could not be reached in time to implement the syllabus in the autumn term, 2006-07 (see Appendix 5).

6. SACRE arrangements

- 6.1 Throughout the year, SACRE received professional support from Nora Leonard, SACRE consultant and projects officer, David Shepherd, independent RE adviser and Jan Parnell 14-19 adviser with responsibility for SACRE. The Committee Section of Democratic Services provided administrative and clerking support.
- 6.2 The LA continues to pay for our membership of NASACRE and for a small amount of attendances at conferences.

Appendix 2

Details of INSET provision

RE co-ordinators and heads of department met in March to discuss the progress of the revision of the agreed syllabus. Discussions were held about the balance of thematic units to units that focussed on single religions. Teachers gave feedback on the house style of the schemes of work in development, commenting that the appended background information would be extremely useful for non-specialist teachers. A number of co-ordinators volunteered to produce additional schemes as examples to be posted on the EGfL.

As the focus during the year was to progress the new syllabus, no formal training in religious education (or collective worship for governors) was offered. SACRE is unaware of any training in religious education or collective worship organised internally by schools.

A series of termly RE network meetings is proposed for the academic year 2006-07, to be organised by the SACRE consultant. It is also hoped that two lead subject teachers, one at primary level and one at secondary, will be appointed to help with the network meetings and future INSET.

Appendix 5

Progress report of Agreed Syllabus Conference

The ASC continued to meet during the year to work on a new syllabus, taking the views of RE coordinators (primary) and heads of department (secondary) into account in their discussions.

However towards the end of the year the group met an impasse, and it was unable to finalise a syllabus to present to SACRE and to schools for the autumn term.

It has now been agreed to work on adapting the existing syllabus, consulting with teachers at the network meetings on a combination of 'topics to be studied' and suggested units for each key stage. In the meantime teachers have been advised to follow the existing syllabus, as well as piloting the schemes of work posted on the EGfL, which have been based on the existing programmes of study.
