<p>Children must be assessed by 26th June at the latest.</p> <p>Results to the LA by 26th June 2020</p>	<p>Each child who will be 5 years old on, or before, 31 August 2020.</p> <p>If a child is retaking the year, submit at end of repeated year / end of reception phase. However, if you have already submitted in a previous year, then will not be able to submit again.</p>	<p>Children who are staying down in EYFS provision beyond the year in which they turn 5. Children should only take the test once at the end of the EYFS stage.</p>	<p>If a child moves to a new school or provider during the academic year, the original school must send the child's development assessments on to their new school.</p> <p>If a child transfers schools or providers before the summer half term holiday, the new school or provider must report the child's EYFS profile data to the LA.</p> <p>If a child transfers schools during the second half of the summer term, the previous school must report the profile data to the LA.</p>	<p>If the child has very recently arrived from abroad (<i>previous ARAs defined this as less than 2 weeks before the submission deadline but the latest ARA says practitioners can use their professional judgement to decide whether an accurate assessment can be made in the time available</i>), their results can be submitted as A – “arrived too late in the summer term for teacher assessment to be carried out’</p> <p>In these cases A must be entered for every aspect – you <i>cannot</i> have a combination of As and scores.</p> <p><i>These children need to be submitted but are <u>not</u> included in the school's figures</i></p>

<p>Results to the LA by Friday June 19th 2020</p> <p>STA will publish the threshold mark on Monday 22nd June on GOV.UK</p>	<p>Pupils who have reached the age of 6 by the end of the school year must take the check during that academic year. For the majority of pupils, they will be in year 1. This includes pupils registered at maintained nursery schools who will reach the age of 6 before the end of the school year.</p> <p>The Phonics test needs to be administered during the week of 8th – 12th June 2020. Pupils who were absent during that week can be tested during the week 15th – 19th June. If a pupil doesn't take the check during this period because of absence and returns to school after Friday 19 June they must be recorded as absent ("A").</p> <p>Pupils shouldn't take the check if:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - they haven't shown any understanding of grapheme-phoneme correspondences; - they have recently moved to the country and are unable to understand letters and sounds in English; - they use British Sign Language or other sign-supported communication, such as communication boards, to spell out individual letters; - they are mute or selectively mute. <p>But they must still be submitted with the "D" code (did not sit the test).</p>		<p>The school where the pupil attended during the phonics check week should submit the check result.</p> <p>If the pupil is still on roll at your school but does not attend during the period 8th – 12th June or 15th – 19th June they must be recorded as A for 'absent'.</p>	<p>Can be marked D – did not sit the test because "recently moved to the country and unable to understand letters & sounds in English".</p> <p><i>They will be included in the school's figures, however.</i></p>

<p>Results to the LA by Friday June 19th 2020</p> <p>STA will publish the threshold mark on Monday 22nd June on GOV.UK</p>	<p>Pupils who will have reached the age of 7 by the end of the academic year (for the majority of pupils, they will be in year 2) who are on roll at your school during phonics check week (8th – 12th June) who did not meet the required standard in year 1.</p> <p>This includes pupils recorded as “D” in year 1 and pupils who haven't taken it before, (<i>for example children who were not in the country in Year 1</i>).</p> <p>You need to check the result for any children who have come to your school from another school to see if they met the standard or not, or whether they have not taken it before and act accordingly.</p> <p>As in Year 1, pupils shouldn't take the check if:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - they haven't shown any understanding of grapheme-phoneme correspondences; - they have recently moved to the country and are unable to understand letters and sounds in English; - they use BSL or other sign-supported communication, such as communication boards, to spell out individual letters; - they are mute or selectively mute. <p>But they must still be submitted with the “D” code (even if you already submitted them as “D” in Year 1).</p>	<p>Any child who achieved the threshold in year 1.</p> <p>Please ensure you only submit details of re-takes, those who have never sat the check and pupils who are taking the test for the first time in your return.</p> <p>If you have Year 2 new arrivals for whom you are unsure if they have taken the phonics test previously, please contact the local authority <u>ahead of test week</u> and we will be able to look into this for you.</p>	<p>The school where the pupil attended during phonics check week period should submit the check result.</p> <p>If the pupil is still on roll at your school but does not attend during the period 8th – 12th June or 15th – 19th June they must be recorded as A for 'absent'.</p>	<p>Can be marked D – did not sit the test because “recently moved to the country and unable to understand letters & sounds in English”.</p> <p><i>They will be included in the school's figures.</i></p>

<p>Last day to submit to the LA - Thursday 25th June 2020</p> <p>This is also the statutory deadline for schools to have submitted their data and completed their head teacher declaration form.</p>	<p>All pupils at the end of KS1.</p> <p>Pupils who are not yet “working towards the expected standard” should be assessed using the interim pre-key stage standard.</p> <p><i>P scales must be used (alongside the “BLW” teacher assessment code) for pupils with SEN who are working below the interim pre-key stage standard. This is the last year that P scales are going to be used</i></p> <p>“NOTSEN” must be used alongside the “BLW” teacher assessment code for non-SEN children who are working below the interim pre key stage standard.</p>		<p>If a pupil changes school before Friday 1 May, the receiving school must administer the KS1 tests to the pupil and submit TA data for them.</p> <p>If a pupil changes school during the KS1 test period (May 2020), the receiving school must find out which tests have already been administered to the pupil and administer any remaining tests. The school where the pupil was registered for the greater number of school days in May should submit TA data for that pupil to the LA.</p> <p>If a pupil changes school after Friday 29 May, the school where the pupil was registered during the KS1 test period must submit TA data.</p> <p>If a pupil arrives at a school from a non-participating school or were EHE, the receiving school should submit data for them. Data should be submitted for any pupils who arrive during the KS1 test period. If a pupil arrives on, or after, 1 June 2020 data is not required.</p>	<p>Recently arrived pupils where the child has not been at the school long enough to generate a body of classwork evidence on which to make a judgment can be given the teacher assessment code A – <i>not enough information to provide a TA judgement.</i></p> <p><i>They will be included in the school's figures, as there is no discounting at KS1</i></p> <p>However, for <u>very</u> new arrivals STA advised one LA last year that “<i>if a pupil arrives after the test administration window (that is after May) they do not need to be included in the school's submission of KS1 teacher assessment. Rather than using a code to represent this, these pupils should be removed from the data submission.</i>”.</p> <p><i>For KS1code “D” – Disapplied from the National Curriculum, can only be used in very specific cases. <u>You should discuss with the LA before submitting this code for any pupils.</u></i></p>

<p>KS2 (to Primary Assessment Gateway): Thursday 25th June 2020</p> <p>This is also the statutory deadline for schools to have submitted their data and completed their head teacher declaration form.</p> <p>If your data is not submitted and any errors resolved by 5pm on 25th June 2020, your teacher assessment data will not be included in the autumn term release of Analyse School Performance or the IDSR.</p>	<p>All pupils at the end of KS2.</p> <p>Pupils older than 11 who have not been assessed before should have this done at the end of the year in which they complete KS2.</p> <p>Pupils who are not yet “working towards the expected standard” in writing or who have not been entered for the tests (<i>because they are working below the standard of the tests in reading and maths</i>) should be assessed using the interim pre-key stage standards.</p> <p><i>P scales must be used (alongside the “BLW” teacher assessment code) for pupils with SEN who are working below the interim pre-key stage standard. This is the last year that P scales are going to be used</i></p> <p>“NOTSEN” must be used alongside the “BLW” teacher assessment code for non-SEN children who are working below the interim pre key stage standard.</p> <p><i>HNM must only be used for children entered for the test who have not achieved the expected standard in the teacher assessment.</i></p>	<p>In 2019 at KS2, the requirement to submit Reading and Maths TAs for children sitting the tests was removed.</p> <p>You <u>must</u> still submit Writing and Science TAs for all children and Reading and Maths TAs for all children who are not taking the tests.</p>	<p>If a pupil changes school before test week, the receiving school must submit TA data for them.</p> <p>If a pupil changes school during test week, the school where the pupil was registered at the beginning of test week must submit TA data for them.</p> <p>If a pupil arrives during test week from a non-participating school or were electively home educated (EHE), the receiving school must submit the TA data for them.</p> <p>If a pupil changes school after test week, the school where the pupil was registered during test week must submit TA data for them.</p> <p>Any child who started your school after the Easter holidays from another school can now be removed from your published data, if you wish to, during the September checking exercise.</p>	<p>Recently arrived pupils where the child has not been at the school long enough to generate a body of classwork evidence on which to make a judgment can be given the teacher assessment code “A” – <i>not enough information to provide a TA judgement</i></p> <p>Any EAL child who arrived from a country with a non-English education system and started school in the UK for the first time on or after the start of Year 5 can be removed from your KS2 published data during the <u>September Checking Exercise.</u></p>
