SACRE ANNUAL REPORT - SEPTEMBER 2004 - AUGUST 2005

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1. Introduction

Ealing Council's SACRE met three times during the academic year 2004-2005. Following the inspection by OfSTED in October 2003, SACRE addressed several of the Inspector's suggestions for improvement in a new development plan. As part of this, SACRE committed itself to playing a key role in the local social cohesion agenda.

The Agreed Syllabus Conference convened in January 2004, with two representatives from each of the four SACRE committees. It has continued to work on the revision of the syllabus, including several consultations with primary and secondary RE co-ordinators. We aim to have the new syllabus available on the Ealing Grid for Learning by September 2006, as well as several sample schemes of work.

SACRE continued to monitor collective worship and religious education in schools, using the relevant extracts from Ofsted inspection reports. However we are also aware that starting in September 2005, these detailed subject reports will no longer be available. As a result we will need to devise a new way to monitor RE provision in Ealing.

Continuing our practice of informative introductory talks, SACRE was pleased to hear from representatives of the Islamic and Sikh faith communities. The Policy Officer Equalities and the Metropolitan Police's Community Liaison Officer (Ealing) also spoke on ways that SACRE members could participate in social cohesion initiatives.

In addition to the poster-sized calendar of festivals, a new on-line version has been created on the Ealing RE website. This contains informative articles about all of the festivals mentioned in the calendar, and can be found at www.religion.ealing.lgfl.net.

2. Religious Education

- 2.1 SACRE has continued to monitor the standards of religious education in the borough's schools by considering relevant extracts from OfSTED reports on schools in the borough. Schools whose reports were being considered were invited to attend and several sent representatives to answer questions and bring SACRE up to date with progress made in addressing the issues in their report.
- 2.2 As this year is the final year that OfSTED will be including detailed subject sections in their reports, SACRE has begun to consider how it will monitor religious education in the future.

3. Collective Worship

- 3.1 On the basis of information obtained from OfSTED reports, SACRE wrote to the Headteacher and the chair of the governing body of those schools that were deemed to be failing in the requirement to conduct a daily act of worship, offering assistance and reminding them of the availability of David Shepherd, the LEA's independent RE adviser.
- 3.2 The following schools applied for a renewal of their determination to opt out of the requirement for collective worship to be wholly or mainly of a broadly Christian character: Acton High School (considered at June 05 meeting), Clifton Primary School (Jan 05), Dormers Wells Infant School (June 05), Dormers Wells Junior School (Jan 05), Durdans Park Primary School (deferred to Sept 05 due to time constraints), Featherstone Primary School (Jan 05), Lady Margaret Primary School (Jan 05), North Primary School (deferred to Sept 05), Three Bridges Primary School (Jan 05), and Wolf Fields Primary School (deferred to Sept 05). Taking in consideration the reports by Cllr Payne and Rabindra Pathak of visits to the schools, as well as additional comments made by school representatives, SACRE voted to renew the determinations of all the schools whose applications were considered.

4. Links with other bodies

- 4.1 SACRE continues its membership of the National Association of SACREs and receives copies of the NASACRE newsletter.
- 4.2 Members who attended the West London Community Cohesion "Faith in each other get together" conference held at Ealing Town Hall 9 March 2005 reported back to SACRE on the issues raised at the June 05 meeting.

5. Other issues

5.1 As in previous years, a calendar was produced by the LEA bearing dates and information about the festivals of many world religions for the use of teachers and others. The LEA liaison to SACRE, Nora Leonard, created an on-line version—"Days of Observance"—with additional articles on each of the festivals and links to other resources of interest on the internet. (http://www.religion.ealing.lgfl.net)

- 5.2 SACRE continued its tradition of informative talks. At the September meeting, Mohinder Grewal, SACRE representative from the Sikh Missionary Society, gave a brief talk on the occasion of the 400th anniversary of the Guru Granth Sahib. Dr Fatma Ahmer of the Interfaith Network of the UK and the RE Council for England and Wales talked about Islam at the January meeting.
- 5.3 Following the report on Ofsted's inspection of Ealing SACRE, a working party was convened to address the issues of the report in an updated Development Plan, which was submitted to SACRE at the January meeting and accepted. As part of the plan, Inspector Colin Wingrove, Ealing's Community Liaison Officer, and Berenice Miles, Policy Officer, Equalities were invited to speak at the June meeting on ways that SACRE could contribute to the Social Cohesion Agenda.
- 5.4 The Agreed Syllabus Conference has continued to work on the revision of Ealing's syllabus, under the guidance of the LEA's independent adviser for religious Education, David Shepherd. Consultations were held with both primary and secondary RE co-ordinators and a draft curriculum map proposed. It was also reported that work had begun on developing schemes of work to support the topics to be studied. A progress report of the ASC can be found in Appendix 6.
- 5.5 It remains a concern of SACRE that the data regarding pupils' religious affiliation in schools does not accurately reflect the various faith groups in Ealing. Members were told that nothing could usefully be done about this until the DfES had completed their consultation on categories to be used in the collection of inclusion, equality and diversity data. This consultation ran from May to August 2005, and the results can be found on the DfES website:

It appears that, at present, as far as the DfES is concerned, a nationally determined list of categories for the collection of religious data is still undecided. A table setting out the religious affiliations of pupils in Ealing, using current categories and collated from the background collection of data from schools in May 2005, can be found in Appendix 7.

6. SACRE arrangements

- Throughout the year, SACRE has received professional support from Nora Leonard, LEA liaison to SACRE and David Shepherd, independent RE adviser. Administrative and clerking support was provided by the Committee Section of Democratic Services (Business Support Directorate).
- 6.2 The LEA continues to pay for membership of NASACRE and a small amount for attendance at conferences.

Appendix 2 Details of INSET provision

Training in Religious Education, September 2004 – August 2005

During the year, four meetings were held for co-ordinators of religious education in primary schools and heads of department in secondary schools. The focus of these meetings was to introduce the topics that might be included in the revised Ealing agreed syllabus. At the spring and summer term meetings, some RE co-ordinators and heads of RE departments agreed to produce a series of lessons for some of the units in the scheme of work. All meetings were organised and led by the borough's adviser for religious education.

During these meetings, curriculum leaders identified that they and their colleagues in schools needed further training to increase their expertise in the topics selected for teaching the revised agreed syllabus. It was agreed that this could be provided in part by the insertion of a 'Background information' section, written by experts, along with each unit of work.

As last year, no training has been organised in religious education or collective worship for governors during the year. SACRE is unaware of any training in religious education or collective worship organised internally by schools. SACRE invites schools to contact the borough's adviser for religious education for advice on collective worship and religious education following its review of the outcomes of the OfSTED inspection reports.

Introduction

These comments are based upon the findings from OfSTED during 2004-05 of six primary schools, one nursery and one secondary school.

Attainment

- Standards are at least at the levels expected in the agreed syllabus. Pupils are making satisfactory progress in learning about religions and their different practices.
- Strengths include:
 - o Some pupils have a good grasp of their own faith and show good respect for the faiths of others.
 - o Pupils generally know about the main practices of some of the major world religions, particularly Christianity, Hinduism, Islam and Sikhism.

Weaknesses:

O Pupils do not learn from religion well enough. They do not apply lessons learnt from religious education lessons to their own lives.

Teaching

- Teaching is satisfactory overall with good features.
- Strengths include:
 - o Religious artefacts and visits to places of worship are used well to help pupils learn.
 - o Good use is made of pupils belonging to different religions to explain customs, practices and beliefs in different religions.
 - o Teachers ask searching questions that identify what pupils know and extend their thinking further.
 - o Good opportunities are provided for pupils to discuss practices and beliefs during lessons.
 - o Lesson planning is good and is clearly linked to the Agreed Syllabus

Weaknesses include:

- o A lack of subject expertise by some teachers hinders pupils' learning on some occasions.
- O Some pupils are asked to draw and colour pictures too much and this does not always help consolidate their learning.
- o Pupils who practise their religion frequently do not always receive teaching that recognises their expertise and is often too easy for them.
- o Pupils do not write enough in religious education. This misses opportunities to consolidate learning and to link literacy skills to religious education.

Provision

• Provision is satisfactory overall.

Strengths include:

- Good use is made of the Agreed Syllabus along with schemes of work from various sources.
- Good use is made of visits are made to places of worship.
- Good use is made of teacher and other adult expertise where this is available.
- Good respect is shown for the different beliefs of others.

Weaknesses include:

- Some teaching is superficial and does not teach the key aspects of religions well enough.
- Not enough time is allocated to religious education in some schools.

Leadership and management

- Satisfactory overall.
- Good leadership is observed in some schools and teachers in those schools are provided with good guidance in their planning.
- Procedures for monitoring and recording progress in religious education are weak overall..

Overall, judgements about provision in religious education are similar to those of the previous year. However, fewer comments have been included in reports this year than was the case last year.

Because of the changes in inspection practices from September 2005, this will be the last report on religious education in this form. During next year, schools will be encouraged to develop their own self-evaluation procedures in religious education as part of their wider self-evaluation practices.

Appendix 6

Progress report of Agreed Syllabus Conference

An Agreed Syllabus Conference (ASC) comprising two members of each of the four SACRE committees and the LEA's independent RE adviser, was established at the autumn 2003 SACRE meeting, following a report making recommendations regarding the statutory review of the syllabus. The ASC agreed that it was important to take into account the results of Ealing SACRE's inspection by OfSTED in 2003, as well as QCA's proposed national framework.

The ASC has met termly during the year and reported to SACRE the progress of developing the revised agreed syllabus. The ASC has taken the views of RE co-ordinators (primary) and heads of department (secondary) into account in their discussions.

To date, the ASC has commented on an initial draft of the revised agreed syllabus. A list of topics for the revised agreed syllabus has been agreed and some units of work to implement these topics have been accepted.
