SACRE ANNUAL REPORT - SEPTEMBER 2006 - AUGUST 2007

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1. Introduction

Ealing's Standing Advisory Council for Religious Education (SACRE) met three times during the 2006-07 school year and conducted a wide range of business. This was the first year in which I have been the chairman of this body and I have very much enjoyed getting to grips with the issues SACRE is required to tackle.

The most significant development in the past year has been the agreement of the new syllabus ("The marriage of heaven and earth") and its subsequent ratification by Cabinet. This has now been disseminated to all schools and I am certain that it will prove to be a great success. On behalf of all members I would once again like to thank those who worked so hard in preparing this document.

I was very pleased that every meeting this year was quorate, not to mention well attended, which I understand has not always been the case in the past. I find it very encouraging that current members are so committed to the work of SACRE. However a concern that I do have is that the number of teacher representatives is relatively low when compared to other local authorities; in particular, representatives from the borough's primary schools are notably thin on the ground. The commitment of the members we have means that the views of teachers are represented at each meeting, however I would like to see as broad a spectrum of representation as possible and for that we need more teachers. I understand that our clerk Ben Thomas is currently contacting the various teachers' unions in order to request nominations for members and I remain hopeful that this will be a fruitful exercise.

An important issue that will need to be discussed in the coming year is whether SACRE should establish a formal mechanism for monitoring the provision of collective worship in our schools. In years gone by this task was relatively simple, as Ofsted would comment on this in their reports. However this is no longer the case and alternative means of monitoring will need to be devised, perhaps through SACRE members visiting schools or by devising a self-evaluation form for schools similar to that which will be used to monitor the provision of RE.

In fact I feel it would be useful to expand the scope of the discussion to include what we actually mean by 'collective worship' and what its relevance is in a modern school setting. It could be argued that the use of the term 'worship' in this context is misleading, as quite often the thrust of school assemblies is to encourage pupils to focus on inner reflections, with themes that are just as relevant to the non-religious as they are to the religious. Members will have a number of differing opinions on this matter and I am certain that we will have a robust and lively discussion.

I am very much looking forward to continuing to work with you all throughout the coming year, which I trust will be as useful and productive as the last.

2. Religious education

- 2.1 As OFSTED had announced their intention to cease producing detailed subject sections in their reports at the beginning of the academic year 2006, SACRE had prior to this time formed a working group that produced a self-evaluation monitoring form for schools to complete. This form has now been piloted in two secondary and two primary schools, with positive results, and it can now be downloaded from the “Guidance for schools” section of the RE pages of the EGfL:

Unfortunately the local authority is not in a position to demand that schools use this evaluation form, and so the problem of effectively monitoring the provision of religious education—a problem shared by other local SACREs—remains.

3. Collective worship

- 3.1 At the June meeting there was a discussion around the possibility of SACRE establishing a mechanism for monitoring the provision of collective worship in schools. This is an important issue as OFSTED no longer comment on collective worship in their reports. It has been agreed that further discussion on this issue will take place after feedback has been received from interested parties, such as head teachers at the quadrant meetings.
- 3.2 There were four applications received from schools for a renewal of their existing determination to opt out of the requirement for collective worship to be wholly or mainly of a broadly Christian character. Beaconsfield Primary School, Blair Peach Primary School, Tudor Primary School and Dormers Wells High School applied for and received renewals of their determinations.

4. Links with other bodies

- 4.1 SACRE continues its membership of the National Association of SACREs and receives copies of the NASACRE newsletter. Cllr Harris and Rev Neil Richardson attended the NASACRE AGM in May, and presented a report of the event at the June SACRE meeting.

5. Other issues

- 5.1 The content of the religious education module for the Caspian educational software was completed and a launch date provisionally set for October 2007. The team responsible for producing this module expressed their gratitude to the SACRE members who participating in the consultation regarding the various virtual environments.
- 5.2 A “Days of Observance” calendar was again produced for the use of schools and LA officers. This poster-sized calendar contains listings for many religious festivals and other dates of note. An on-line version includes informative articles about all of the festivals mentioned in the calendar, and can be found at www.egfl.org.uk/religion.
- 5.3 SACRE continued the tradition of beginning the meetings with brief informative talks. In September, Alim Shaikh, deputy manager, Ealing City Learning Centre, gave a

short presentation on the Caspian education software. In January Richard Jones, London Buddhist Vihara, gave a talk entitled 'A short introduction to Buddhism'. Due to the amount of business to be conducted at the June meeting there was no talk scheduled.

- 5.4 The background collection of data in May 2006 revealed that 25% of the pupils in schools across the borough were Muslim. A committee was established composed of SACRE members, local authority officers and school representatives in order to draft guidance for our schools. It had been originally intended to advise schools solely on how best to deal with absenteeism of Muslim pupils during religious festivals such as Eid. However the document was subsequently expanded in order to cover a wide variety of issues, such as participation in music and swimming lessons, about which parents of Muslim pupils had previously raised concerns. The document was circulated to schools and mosques in the borough and very positive feedback was received.
- 5.5 The Ealing Grid for Learning (EGfL) website has been updated and a new content management system put in place. Religious education has been given its own site and SACRE was allocated a section of this, which contains previous annual reports, information on the RE curriculum, religious festivals and links to websites related to the various religions represented on SACRE (see: www.egfl.org.uk/religion.)
- 5.6 At the June meeting SACRE members agreed that Dr Anthony Constable, Humanist representative, be appointed to the Other Faiths group, rather than attending meetings as a co-opted member.
- 5.7 Joy Barrow, Free Church Council and chairman of the Other Faiths group, and Geoff Edwards, chairman of the Church of England group, both resigned from SACRE after a number of years of service. On behalf of all members the chairman wrote to them both to thank them for their valuable contributions.
- 5.8 In June Rev Neil Richardson and Mr M Grewal were elected as chairmen of the Church of England and Other Faiths groups respectively.
- 5.9 The Agreed Syllabus Conference, composed of members from each of the four SACRE committees, met on several occasions to work on the content and format of the new syllabus. A consensus on the syllabus was reached and SACRE formally recommended it to the local authority at the June meeting. The syllabus was subsequently ratified by Cabinet on 24 July 2007. Cabinet recommended that the new syllabus be implemented in schools in time for the start of the 2007-08 autumn term. It was however recognised that it may take schools a while to switch to the new programmes of study.

6. SACRE arrangements

- 6.1 Throughout the year, SACRE received professional support from Nora Leonard, SACRE consultant, and Jan Parnell, 14-19 adviser with responsibility for SACRE. Ben Thomas, democratic services officer, provided administrative and clerking support.
- 6.2 The LA continues to pay for our membership of NASACRE and for a small amount of attendances at conferences.

Appendix 2

Details of INSET provision

Network meetings for both primary and secondary RE co-ordinators were held in the autumn and winter terms. At their 12th October meeting, secondary heads were updated on the progress of the syllabus, and shown a series of resources available on the new RE curriculum section of the EGfL. Robin Burks (KS3 teaching and learning consultant) discussed the role of lead subject teachers and encouraged the secondary heads to submit suitable recommendations from the RE teachers in their departments.

The role of a lead subject teacher in RE was also discussed at the primary network meeting on 9th November. The teachers discussed the draft programmes of study for key stages 1 and 2, as well as offering comments regarding the recommended number of core and optional units. Useful schemes of work already available on the internet were explored, as well as the wealth of online resources.

Vivi Lachs, curriculum director of Hackney CLC, gave a presentation about some of Hackney's projects during the secondary RE network meeting on 7th February; she also handed out copies of the student-made videos looking at the nature of barriers. Topics for the summer RE conference were proposed, and members of the group volunteered to facilitate. Alim Shaikh gave a brief demonstration of the virtual environments that had been designed for the RE module of the Caspian education games software.

The bulk of the 7th March meeting of the primary RE network was devoted to a session on assessment presented by Keith Field, consultant RE adviser for Hillingdon. Keith took the group through a series of steps designed to set relevant assessment questions or tasks, and then the teachers broke into groups in order to brainstorm some examples.

On 15 June 2007, the primary RE conference was held at Ealing Education Centre. Eight sessions in all were offered, including workshops on teaching each of the five core religions, as well as sessions devoted to identifying pupils who are gifted in the subject, and a discussion of the difficulties that might arise when you are teaching faiths that aren't your own beliefs. Facilitators included Surinder Lall (Featherstone PS), Judy Johnson (West Twyford PS), Nora Leonard (SACRE consultant), Tasneem Ebrahimji (Gifford PS), Alim Shaik (Ealing CLC), and Jay Lakhani (Hindu Council of Britain). Tasheen and Azhar Sheikh were on hand to demonstrate the excellent resource pack for teaching Islam at key stages 1 and 2 that they had developed for the Muslim Council of Britain. Keith Field reprised his session on assessment, and during the video welcome by Simon Prebble (principle adviser, primary strategy manager) it was announced that Judy Johnson had been appointed as lead subject teacher in religious education for the academic year 2007-08.

The secondary RE conference was held at the Ealing City Learning Centre on 6 July 2007. Jan Parnell, 14-19 adviser with SACRE responsibility, opened the proceedings with the news that the syllabus had been passed by SACRE to Cabinet for ratification. There were sessions on promoting religious studies (facilitated by Megan Dee, West London Academy), raising attainment (Axel Fouabi, Featherstone), schemes of work (Suzy Cole, Dormers Wells) and RE for SEN and gifted and talented (Paul Faux, St Anns and Nora Leonard, SACRE consultant). During the lunch break teachers were able to trial the beta version of the Caspian educational games software.

Appendix 5

Progress report of Agreed Syllabus Conference (ASC)

At the end of the 2005-06 academic year the ASC had unfortunately met an impasse, and were unable to finalise a syllabus to present to SACRE and to schools for the autumn term.

However with the appointment of Nora Leonard to the role of SACRE consultant, it was agreed to adapt the existing syllabus rather than start the process over from scratch. At an ASC meeting held on 13th September 2006, a small working party comprised of two teacher representatives (Helen Keogh and Helen O’Neill), Geoff Edwards and Nora Leonard was elected to draft programmes of study for the new syllabus. This working group met twice, and were subsequently able to present a draft document to the ASC in December.

This working document (“The marriage of heaven and earth”) was presented to full SACRE at the January meeting, at which time it was agreed that it be taken by individual members to their faith groups for consultation. It was also sent out to schools, and at the June meeting SACRE agreed to send the final version to Cabinet, which formally ratified the syllabus on 24th July 2007.
