Ofsted and RE

Dr Richard Kueh is Ofsted's subject lead for RE. A qualified teacher, he holds Masters degrees in Theology and Religious Studies, a Doctorate in Philosophy and a PGCE. Before joining Ofsted, Richard taught in maintained schools, independent schools and universities. He has senior experience as director of a regional school improvement partnership, director of teacher training and development for a multi-academy trust, deputy headteacher of a secondary school and associate headteacher of a primary school. Richard's areas of expertise include curriculum, assessment, teacher development, inclusion and initial teacher education. And a major new research paper on RE was published by Ofsted on 12th May!

In this review, Ofsted has:

- outlined the national context in relation to RE
- summarised its review of research into factors that can affect the quality of education in RE
- considered curriculum progression in RE, pedagogy, assessment and the impact of school leaders' decisions on provision.

The report refers to three different types of knowledge used in RE. These broad types of knowledge are 'pillars of progression' within RE. 'Getting better' at RE comprises knowing more of these pillars as they are set out within the RE curriculum:

- First, 'substantive' knowledge: knowledge about various religious and non-religious traditions or worldviews.
- Second, 'ways of knowing': pupils learn 'how to know' about religion and worldviews.
- Third, 'personal knowledge': pupils build an awareness of their own presuppositions and values about the religions and worldviews they study.

According to the report, high-quality RE may have the following features:

- A consideration of the knowledge that pupils build through the RE curriculum, because accurate knowledge about religions and worldviews can be beneficial for achieving different purposes and aims for RE.
- High expectations about scholarship in the curriculum to guard against pupils' misconceptions - what is taught and learned in RE is grounded in what is known about religions and worldviews from academic study (scholarship).
- Carefully selected and well-sequenced substantive content and concepts.
- 'Ways of knowing' are appropriately taught alongside the substantive content and are not isolated from the content and concepts that pupils learn.
- A consideration of when pupils should relate the content to their own personal knowledge (for example, prior assumptions).

Free Resources and Support from the British Library

To support schools in the current period and beyond, **The British Library** is offering a range of learning materials that aim to replicate activities from its face-to-face workshops. These can be used at any time to fit in with your teaching schedule. This session explores the richness and diversity of sacred texts from a range of different religions and looks at the deep connections and common threads that link them. Activities are presented in short-form video format and look at special texts from the Library's collections and engage with digitised items spanning written texts as well as visual and audio content. The videos are supported by full teachers' notes and learner-friendly activity sheets.



How does it work?

- When you contact them, you will be connected with one of the British Library Learning Facilitators who created these materials
- They will share the materials with you, explain how they can be used in your classroom or for remote learning, and answer any questions you might have. They will arrange to do this with you over email or in a video call
- You use the materials with your class to run the activities in lesson time
- After you've run the session/s, your Learning Facilitator can offer a 30-minute video call for your class to share what they have been working on and ask questions on the topic or about the British Library
- Staff will be in touch to request feedback from you and your class on how everything went, as part of the Library's commitment to continual improvement of its programme.
