### Impact Evaluation 2015

## Breadth and efficiency of 16-18 Provision

Young people accessed a range of providers for post-16 provision including schools and colleges; new provision offering access to Apprenticeships and Traineeships was opened by colleges and providers in the borough and taken up. Post-16 offer in schools is still mostly restricted to L3. Some issues with quality of provision for L2 Eng and Maths at post-16 emerged.

Quality issues with EHWLC have emerged through the publication of the Ofsted data dashboard. 2 out of 5 of the most popular FE destinations for Ealing 16-18s are RI providers with poor outcomes at EHWLC for learners at EL and Leve 1 - particularly vulnerable learners. IAG in schools needs to reflect these concerns, as well as working with the College to support improvement. Use of Ealing sites for FE provision under review at the College, and issues are emerging about the shape of provision within Ealing in the future.

#### **Participation**

Participation levels remain high; (March 2015) 95.4 % of all 16+17 year olds in Ealing participated in EET (96.2 in March 2014) London respectively 93.5% in 2015 and 92.3 in 2014%. The rate of participation for 17 year olds has increased a lot, nationally and in London, at 94.5% of Ealing 17 year olds in EET in Mar 2015 (London 91.2%.) Still over 5% of the cohort NEET however. September Guarantee figs indicate that 94.0% of Ealing yr 11 and 12 leavers were

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offered a place by 30 Sept 2014, slight decline on 2013 (W.London Average 94.2%)

Full RPA begins September 2015 with all students now expected to stay in EET until age 18. RPA enforced through providers reporting drop out from post-16 from Ealing schools and other providers to London Councils portal, with referrals to Connexions. Most but not all providers in Ealing make returns.

Apprenticeships - take-up at Level 2 low but steady; Level 3 apprenticeships are rarer opportunities, Connexions currently auditing availability.

### NEET

Most recent position re NEET shows that 3.00% overall of 16-18s are NEET in Dec 2014 (2013 comparable figure was 3.3%), and that Ealing is in the top national quintile for this indicator, along with 11 out of 19 Outer London boroughs.

### **RONI System**

Number of schools submitting RONI results and using the system rose significantly from 5 in 2013-14 to 11 in 2014-15. LA analysis has calculated RON attainment and progression data which is being fed back to schools in Autumn 2015.

### First annual 14-19 Conference November 2014

Raised levels of understanding of achievement, progression and IAG patterns and issues through 14-19 Conference (Nov 2014) attended by 78 colleagues from 41 provider and partner organisations; contributed to building collaboration; outcomes of conference reinforced through Networks and their activities (provider, Post-16 Leaders and IAG leaders)

New curriculum - new examinations being introduced at GCSE and A Level from 2015, as well as new assessment for Vocational qualifications from 2014 and new content from 2016

Networks have helped to prepare colleagues for the changes and their implications. Many uncertainties aired and shared, will continue into 2015-16, with monitoring of impact on uptake.

### Networks

- IAG network has been revised to focus on leadership and priorities, rather than content of IAG programmes. This has resulted in clearer focus and development towards a stronger cadre of career managers in school.
- Post-16 network very well attended, with focus on issues around new curriculum, progression (especially non-full-time HE routes) funding and sixth form ethos.
- Inclusion network less well attended, but interest established in key areas of post-16 (RONI, progression for vulnerable learners, 17+ participation, access to Apprenticeships and EAL) Group to be re-formulated to meet this demand.

### New 14-19 project around NEET (led by Connexions)

West London Alliance and New Homes Bonus funding have provided a project to create a new model of support in school for those at risk of non-participation. 3 schools to trial new approaches with mentoring and business support. (Brentside, Villiers and Northolt)

### **Qualification outcomes**

### Post 16 Academic qualifications:

Points per student decreased by 12 points from 2014 to 741. There were large falls in four schools, mainly due to the policy of more students taking three rather than four subjects at A level. Five schools had large increases in points per student. This measure continues to be below the 2014 national average. Points per entry declined slightly from 2014 by 3 points to 217. This is below the target but just above the national average for 2014. Six schools improved on this measure including two securing good schools. The % achieving 3 or more A levels declined from 84% to 80% which was the NA for 2014. The % gaining 2 or more A levels declined to 91% and the % gaining 1 or more A levels reduced to 98%. Both are now below the 2014 national average.

## **Post-16 Vocational qualifications**

Points per student decreased by 23 points from 2014 to 665 which is well above the 2014 NA of 560. There were falls in four schools and increases in six schools, three with very large increases. Points per entry improved from 2014 by 1 point to 224 which is below the target but well above the national average of 216.6 for 2014. Eight schools improved on this measure including four securing good schools. The % achieving 3 or more substantial vocational qualifications declined by 19% to 44%, the % gaining 2 or more declined by 10% to 76% and the % gaining 1 or more substantial vocational qualifications reduced by 10% to 90%. Only the measure for 2 substantial vocational qualifications is above the 2014 national average.

# English and maths at post-16

The A\* to C pass rate for age 17 (For those who already have a D grade pass) fell from 38.9 per cent last year to 35.8 per cent for maths, and from 37.9 per cent in 2014 to 35.1 per cent this year for English. Those with E or below take functional skills. This is a national figure, and Ealing figure not yet available; this remains a key area for urgent improvement of pass rates, as this is crucial to progression and prospects for employment.

### L2 qualifications at Age 17

The DfE has not published any L2 at post 16 achievements for 2014. 2015 outcomes should be published in 2016 as part of the new post-16 accountability measures. Now need to collect uptake and outcome data locally. Again these qualifications are crucial for progression. They are offered at the college, and in only a few schools.

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
